# The Winter of our Founding-February 1910

Nearly one hundred years ago the Beloit Historical Society had its beginning. The month was February and the year 1910, A group of Beloit enthusiasts banded together to establish an organization with the purpose of saving Beloit history, preserving it for tuture generations. They discussed and planned in each others' homes until a building could be found in which they could meet and where the public could come to visit. In the summer of 1910 they found their building on West Grand Avenue, It was into the Carnegie Library that they moved. The Beloit Historical Society resided there for forty four years.

The Beloit Historical Society was born in a time so different from our own that a sketchy reminder of what it was like should prove interesting. To appreciate that time one hundred years ago let us take a look through the pages of the Beloit Daily Free press and see what the publishers had to report on certain days through Lebruary 1910. What follows are headlines and brief articles of information that will, we hope, give you a flavor of the time in The Winter of Our Beginning.

#### February 2

Butter climbs up one penny. A pound of butter now selling for 35 cents.

#### Haley's Comet visible in Beloit about April 1

Later developments in scarlet fever hysteria. Child dies from severe case of scarlet fever. Five cent theatres fumigated by city health officer. Street cars fumigated by the city health officer. New case of scarlet fever in the high school, where no attempt has been made to fumigate. Special meeting of the school board called for tonight at which question of closing the schools will be discussed.

These snippets from the Free Press, we hope, give an impression of what life in 1910 was like. In future issues of *Confluence* we will write on other decades through which the Society has passed in this city of our; and bring you to the end of 2010 with a contemporary article. # **Upcoming Events**

Bus Tour: The Newberry, St. John Cantius Church and the Chicago Firehouse Restaurant

The Newberry Library was founded in the late nineteenth century from a bequest by Walter Loomis Newberry (1804-1868), a Chicago land developer and city leader. Over the years it has developed into a world class resource center specializing in illuminated medieval manuscripts, rare early maps, rich genealogical sources, historical sheet music, and personal papers. It so happens that during the month of October a rare exhibit on Abraham Lincoln entitled "With Malice Toward None" will be on display, making the visit more interesting. The Newberry is only one of five locations this Library of Congress exhibit will visit.

Then we will visit the St. John Cantius Church founded by Polish Immigrants and completed in 1898. The Romanesque Church is ornamented by a rich Baroque design, examples of art in inlaid wood floors, altars, carvings, murals, and stained glass windows. It is one of Chicago's unique churches.

Between the two stops we will dine at the ever popular Firehouse Restaurant on South Michigan Avenue. The Restaurant was initially a fire station built in 1905 to serve the Prairie Avenue Community which at that time consisted of the Marshall Fields, the McCormicks, the Palmers and the Glessners. The Society made this stop on one of its previous tours.

## A Family Resource

Were your ancestors some of the Civil War soldiers who were quartered in the American House at Broad and Pleasant in Beloit? Did your early family members listen to Abraham Lincoln's political speech at Hanchett Hall on October 1 1859? Do you know if you descended from "Shoe Peg" Wood? Or what circumstances lead to that nickname? Does Caleb Blodgett, first permanent settler of Beloit, figure in your family history?

These intriguing questions can be answered by genealogical research. The Beloit Historical Society is rich with information on the families that were here in the beginning of Beloit's history. Files bulge with information about the founders and the first families of Beloit: The Hacketts, the Blodgetts, the Cranes, the Tuttles and many more. Many followed after them and some stayed to develop with Beloit, others moved further west.

The Luebke Family Library at the Historical Society contains volumes of books, maps, city directories, family histories and photographs that define the history of Beloit and its people. Old newspapers tell in many flowery accounts of the births, marriages and deaths of the area's inhabitants. Obituaries abound with information. Maybe the resources at the Historical Society have something for you and your family tree. Check us out.

# Did you know?

Shirley Geffers has been cataloging for the Historical Society for nearly ten years. In that time she has handled 1,995 assessions. An Assession can, and usually does, have more than one item to it. For example a person donates a uniform with shoes, ties and hats. It is one assession but numerous pieces that go with it. With that in mind Shirley has entered information on 4,010 pieces.
