The Beloit Historical Society and the City of Beloit in 1915

In the last issue of Confluence the Historical Society took a look at the city of Beloit in the year 1910 and the month of February which was the date of the Beloit Historical Society's founding. We follow up in this issue with a look at 1915. At this time the Historical Society was ensconced at the Carnegie Library that was located on West Grand Avenue. What follows are briefs from the Beloit Daily Free Press relating to the goings on in the city of Beloit.

February 2

The Common Council sets the salary for the City Engineer at \$1,500 a year. Former salary was \$5 per day.

Boulevard Lights Granted

The street lights committee reported favorably for cluster boulevard lights for East Grand Ave., from the Northwestern tracks to Pleasant St., and State St., from the Milwaukee tracks to Public Ave. A big majority of the property owners along these two streets signed the petition.

Asks Spur Tracks

The petition of Edward Brannigan of the City Ice company for a spur track across Eclipse Ave., at the east end of "upper bridge"[Portland Ave.] was referred to the public works committee to report at the next council meeting and a petition of Mr. Brannigan for use of the city pile driver was referred to the same committee with power to act.

Several tax rebates were then granted by the council while others were refused outright and still others referred to the 1915 board of review. The annual report of the chief of police was received and made part of the minutes. The city sexton's report showing \$192 cemetery receipts for the past month was received and placed on file.

February 3

Movie Machine at High School to show

J.V. Hogan, manager of the Rex Theatre, has closed a contract for the installation at the high school of a complete moving picture outfit. It is the latest type power 6A machine and will be fitted with a steropticon attachment.

February 5

Beloit was host to the Grand Human Menagerie which exhibited here July 31, 1875. The Menagerie consisted of the Giant Seek-a-Seek, the Baron Pompalino, the White Elephant, The Royal Shanghai, The Dutch Dwarf, and The Whirligig—a four armed dancing boy. Admission was 5 cents for adults and 2 cents for children under 7 years. Doors opened at Fosters at 2 p.m., the program started at 3 p.m. [Fosters was located at the far east end of St. Paul Ave.]
