
from our over-sized photo collection. The images we've chosen add to or accentuate a Beloit story, though they may not appear to at first




Board meetings are the third Thursday of every month at 4:15 p.m. and are held at Lincoln Center, 845 Hackett Street.




The heritage of Beloit will be celebrated this 7th & 8th of September 2013 with the annual Heritage **Days** festivities. See the insert for details.
